


MUSICAL NOTES

MUSICAL NOTES

When Jesus went to Jordan's stream (Hymn 139) is a narrative hymn-text by Martin Luther, telling the story of Jesus' baptism. We sing an English paraphrase from *The Hymnal 1982* at Communion. The tune, originating from Luther's orbit (and perhaps composed by him) was used as the basis of the organ pieces played this morning. Buxtehude places the melody in the topmost voice, decorating it lightly. In Bach's treatment, the tune is in the tenor-register, accompanied below by a murky, swirling stream of sixteenth-notes vividly evoking the baptismal river, and above by a two-part dialogue that commentators have suggested represents the conversation between Jesus and John the Baptist in Matthew's account of their interaction, when Jesus must convince John to baptize him, "to fulfill all righteousness."

Peter Hallock was for many years the Canon Precentor of St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle, and a composer of considerable renown within and beyond the Church. His brief setting of a medieval text commemorating the Baptism of Jesus (always observed on the First Sunday after the Epiphany) alternates between Latin and English, and between choral and solo textures. It is dedicated to Hallock's contemporary, the great American Roman Catholic musician Richard Proulx.

TODAY: The Fundamentals of Good Mission

Mission, both in the sense of spreading the Gospel and trying to make the world a better place, is a fundamental tenant of our Christian Faith. Yet despite with best of intentions, many of our missionary experiences, whether foreign or domestic, meet with poor results and track records that leave the communities we had hoped to help little better off than when we found them. This forum will explore the fundamental aspects of successful mission and service learning endeavors such that visiting groups experience a deeper sense of accomplishment and appreciation for their hosts while the hosting community comes away with a newly empowered sense of self-worth and agency. The background for this forum will stem from The Rev. Zach Drennen's 7 years of experience living and working as a missionary in Western Kenya and making all of the aforementioned mistakes – so you don't have to!

Sunday, January 17: Looking at Prayer with a Thomistic Lens: *Beauty*

Thomas Aquinas has made significant contributions to Christian theological understanding in the areas of "natural reason" and "speculative theology." This session will consider Beauty (one of three "transcendental properties of being") as a means to ground one's personal prayer with meditation on the "big picture" as it might inspire acts of charity and justice toward one's goal of making progress in the Christian universal call to holiness. THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Father in heaven, who at the baptism of Jesus in the River Jordan proclaimed him your beloved Son and anointed him with the Holy Spirit: Grant that all who are baptized into his Name may keep the covenant they have made, and boldly confess him as LORD and Savior; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. *Amen.*

A Reading from the Book of Isaiah [43:1-7]

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba in exchange for you. Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. Do not fear, for I am with you; I will bring your offspring from the east, and from the west I will gather you; I will say to the north, "Give them up," and to the south, "Do not withhold; bring my sons from far away and my daughters from the end of the earth—everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made."

[3:15-17, 21-22]

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."
