

#### MUSICAL NOTES


On Wednesday evening, January 15, Pittsburgh-based clarinetist Alex Jones and the Saturn String Quartet from Roanoke, Virginia, will present a chamber-music concert in Calvary's beautiful McClintic Hall (on Level G of the parish house). The program is two of the great works for this instrumental combination: the clarinet quintets of Mozart and Brahms. Admission is free, thanks to the Friends of Music, although a free-will offering will be accepted.

Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam ("Our Lord Christ to Jordan came") is a sixteenth-century German hymn, its text by Martin Luther, and its music by an anonymous associate of Luther's; it was published in 1524. Like a number of Luther's hymns, it is narrative in structure, both telling the story of Christ's baptism and interpreting it theologically. Such vernacular narratives with interwoven interpretation were a deliberate strategy of Luther and his reforming colleagues, as they strove to raise the level of Biblical literacy and theological insight in their flocks; the reinforcement of the poetic text with a musical tune was an aid to memorization and internalization of the words, to permit the theology itself to be sung in the believer's heart, as well as in church.

Buxtehude presents Luther's melody, lightly ornamented, as the top-most voice of a fairly simple four-part texture. Bach, on the other hand, gives this chorale a highly symbolic treatment. He assigns the melody itself to the organist's feet (it is heard in relatively long notes, in the alto register); below this melody, a swirling torrent of sixteenth-notes evokes Jordan's murky depths, and above it a two-voice dialogue suggests the conversation on the river's bank between Jesus and John.



### The Fourth Anniversary of the Haiti Earthquake

As Haiti prepares to mark the fourth anniversary of the devastating earthquake in 2010, Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori has asked the Episcopal Church to remember the Diocese of Haiti on the fourth anniversary of the earthquake on January 12. TODAY: **Light in the Gothic Tradition and at Calvary.** The Gothic style of architecture was conceived as a way to open up the dark, fortress-like Romanesque church to allow light to pour in. The effect of such light on stone was to seem to dematerialize it, to transform it into something not of this world. Abbot Suger invented this style at St.-Denis in Paris in 1140, believing that contemplation of the physical fabric of the church dissolving in light was a means to Christian spiritual enlightenment. This illustrated talk will discuss the basis of Gothic structure in its original European context, as well as show how Cram adapted it to create Calvary's light-filled design. Gillian Cannell, of the Architecture and History Committee, will be the presenter.

January 19, 2014: **The Neighborhood Academy.** Jodie Moore, co-founder and president of The Neighborhood Academy, will trace their trajectory from the youth group that Calvary supported to the fully formed and fledged high school, on its own campus, that it is today. ### New Rector Transition Update

The excitement surrounding the arrival of our new Rector, Jonathon and his wife Natalie is very palpable here at Calvary. Everyone is eager to welcome them with Calvary's generous hospitality. We are fortunate that everyone in the parish will have a chance to demonstrate that hospitality in a wide range of settings. I will be working with Jonathon, the Vestry, the Calvary Staff, and all of you to help coordinate the many activities that will occur during the first few months of 2014. There are three things that we are doing for the transition that I would like to call to your attention now, so you can decide how you would like to participate in welcoming Jonathon and Natalie to Pittsburgh.

- 1) "Pounding" the Rectory: This tradition draws its name from each parishioner donating a pound of something (butter, flour, etc) so that the Rector's new household will be up and running as quickly as possible after the move. We are going to do this just like we do the Berry Project. Starting today, pick one, two or ten(!) berries and sign the list with your name, email and phone number. Then, make the purchase and return the items to Calvary by Sunday, January 26 so that they can be sorted, packaged, and delivered to the Jensen's new home when they arrive. - 2) First Service Reception, Sunday February 2, 2014: Becky Randall has graciously volunteered to work with Weezie Wells to help coordinate a reception for Jonathon and Natalie after the 11 o'clock service that day. Becky has already assembled a small core team to help take care of logistics. We need volunteers to flex their culinary muscles to help prepare finger foods for the reception. If you would like to participate in this way, please make yourself known to me, Becky Randall, or Weezie Wells.
- 3) Neighborhood Gatherings: As soon after Jonathon's arrival as possible, we will begin a series of small neighborhood gatherings (15-20 people each) in which Jonathon can establish a dialogue with us on a more personal level. This will be similar to a Foyer group, but with much less food preparation. Jonathon has a wonderfully detailed model of how he would like these to work.

We will need somewhere between 20-25 groups. Each group requires two very important volunteers. First and foremost, the host. Secondly, someone to drive the Rector to and from each gathering, and take notes on the discussion. This discussion will be centered around one basic question: "What does your new Rector need to know?" This forum will be your chance to meet with Jonathon and your fellow parishioners in a small group so we can all discuss the great future that lies ahead for Calvary.

The planning for these neighborhood gatherings is in full swing and invitations will be going out very soon. While we encourage you to attend a neighborhood gathering if at all possible, we are also offering gatherings after the 11 o'clock service for those of you that simply can not attend on a week night, or if you happen to miss one of the gatherings that happens in your neighborhood. #### THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Father in heaven, who at the baptism of Jesus in the River Jordan proclaimed him your beloved Son and anointed him with the Holy Spirit: Grant that all who are baptized into his Name may keep the covenant they have made, and boldly confess him as LORD and Savior; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. *Amen.* 

#### A Reading from the Book of Isaiah [42:1-9]

"Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations. He will not cry or lift up his voice, or make it heard in the street; a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his teaching." #### A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles [10:34-43]

Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ-he is LORD of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

## The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew [3:13-17]

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."
