MUSICAL NOTES

Georg Böhm (1661-1733) and Vincent Lübeck (1654-1740) were German organists and composers in the decades before J.S. Bach. They represent a generation between Bach and the older (but still active) Buxtehude, who died only in 1707. When the newly-orphaned Bach went to live with his elder brother in 1700, it was in the town of Lüneburg, where Böhm lived and worked. Böhm surely met and likely mentored the young Bach; a quarter-century later, Böhm was named as a sales-agent for a newly published keyboard work of Bach.

Böhm's keyboard compositions are fairly evenly divided between organ music and pieces that seem better-suited to the harpsichord; the Prelude today (based on a German hymn extolling Christ as the Day and Light) is one of only a handful of his hymn-based pieces to include an independent pedal part (and that only in the third and final *verset*).

Lübeck was active farther north, at the small town of Stade for some years, and later in the metropolis of Hamburg. He seems to have modeled his few surviving *Praeludia* on the form commonly used by Buxtehude and other northerners: alternating sections of quasi-improvisatory toccata-like writing and fairly brief fugues, with the toccata-like sections framing the whole. The key of E major is quite unusual for Lübeck's time and place, as the organs then were typically tuned in such a way that the key's four sharps would've made for rather hair-raising harmonies. The pitch of the organ in Stade was set about a third higher than was common elsewhere; it seems possible that this *Praeludium* originated in C, for that organ, and was transposed up to E to produce a similar "feel" on other instruments.

TODAY: In Celebration of The Reverend Samuel Moor Shoemaker.

Sam Shoemaker served as the twelfth rector of Calvary Church from 1952 to 1961. In addition to outstanding work at Calvary, he founded The Pittsburgh Experiment and was the acknowledged "spiritual mentor" in the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous. He is recognized as the spiritual father of the now famous *Twelve Steps* in AA. Sam has been included in that most distinctive book of the Episcopal Church entitled *Holy Women, Holy Men*, a compilation of the lives of men and women from a great variety of spiritual commitments who have been exemplary in their love of God and service to neighbor. The day assigned for the celebration of Sam Shoemaker is January 31. In his honor, Father John Fetterman, our theologian in residence, will offer reflections on Sam's life and work. The reflections will focus on particular item in the *Twelve Steps* as excellent spiritual guides for everybody whether members of AA or not. Emphasis will be given to the following topics with numbers corresponding to the *Twelve Steps*: (1) Powerlessness, (3) Turning to God "as God is understood", (8) Making Amends when feasible, (12) Spiritual Awakening throughout ones life.

Sunday, February 2: Meet our New Rector. On his first Sunday at Calvary, the Rev. Jonathon Jensen will speak at the Adult Forum. Join us for this opportunity to get to know Jonathon and to hear his thoughts and reflections as he begins his ministry here.



A Reading from the Book of Isaiah [9:1-4]

But there will be no gloom for those who were in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he will make glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations. The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian.

A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians [1:10-18]

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Congregation: Thanks be to God.


**The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew
[4:12-23]**

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now when Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles – the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea – for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.
