## MUSICAL NOTES

Charles Piroye (c. 1670-1730) was a composer active in Paris in the early decades of the eighteenth century, a member of the generation that came of age hearing the music of Lully, Charpentier, and Couperin, and then grew to succeed them. Unlike the organ music of Couperin, which was structured to function liturgically during the Mass, Piroye's small surviving output of organ music falls into the genre of "character piece," mostly with fanciful titles (such as *La Béatitude*; in this case, the link between the music and its title remains obscure). The piece comes from his small volume of "Select Pieces for Organ," published in 1712. *La Béatitude* is cast as a series of fairly brief contrasting movements, evidently intended to be played on the distinct sounds of different parts of the organ – the lighter "Petit Jeu" on which it begins, and the heavier "Grand Jeu" which succeeds and then alternates with the smaller sound.

## MUSICAL NOTES

The Estonian composer Arvo Pärt (b. 1935) has become something of an international sensation, compiling a substantial body of very powerful choral works, including a great many on sacred texts. Although his early music was heavily influenced by Schoenberg and other modernists of the early twentieth century, study of Gregorian chant and Renaissance music drew him in a different direction, which is sometimes termed “mystic minimalism.” (Other names associated with this style include Henryk Górecki and John Tavener.) His setting of the Beatitudes (1990) is in this style; the text is declaimed slowly and chordally, with individual voices exchanging notes for an unusual and somewhat paradoxical effect of motion without harmonic change.

Charles Piroye (c. 1670-1730) was a composer active in Paris in the early decades of the eighteenth century, a member of the generation that came of age hearing the music of Lully, Charpentier, and Couperin, and then grew to succeed them. ## Calvary 2017 Lent Theological Reading Group

During Lent this year the group will read several works by St. Anselm of Canterbury including the *Monologion*, *Proslogion*, *On the Incarnation of the Word*, and *Why God Became Man*. Anselm was an 11th century monk, abbot, philosopher, theologian, bishop, and eventually Archbishop of Canterbury from 1093 to 1109. Among his main achievements were the development of the ontological argument for the existence of God and the satisfaction theory of atonement, as well as his overall body of work which is regarded as one of the earliest in what became known as the scholastic tradition.

**A Reading from the First Letter of Paul  
to the Corinthians [1:18-31]**

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the LORD."

*Congregation:* Thanks be to God.

Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."
