MUSICAL NOTES

Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713-80) was a pupil and protégé of J. S. Bach. Generally accounted a minor figure in the broader compositional hierarchy, his music perpetuated the style of his master-teacher for decades after Bach's death. His chorale-settings apply the myriad lessons of Bach's hymn-treatments to a wide swath of other melodies, many of which had not been addressed in Bach's *organ-oeuvre*.

An English monk, Bede (d. 735) was never officially beatified or canonized, despite the esteem in which he was held by his contemporaries and later generations; this leaves him with the unusual title, "Venerable." He wrote an important early history of the English people (with emphasis on the English Church), three centuries before the Norman Conquest, in addition to various theological works. The beautiful prayer attributed to him adorns his modern shrine in the Galilee Chapel at Durham Cathedral.

Alcuin, another English monk, was a tutor and advisor to Charlemagne, the Frankish king who consolidated the German-speaking peoples into the "Holy Roman Empire" (an entity often described by historians as having been none of those three things). Charlemagne's chief contribution to ecclesiastical and liturgical history was the prescription of ritual uniformity throughout the far-flung Church; this extended to music, and resulted in the development of notation to ensure the accurate transmission of officially-sanctioned melodies for the increasingly codified rites of the Western liturgy across the ninth century. The poetic paraphrase of Alcuin's prayer is perhaps the best-known of more than three-hundred hymn-texts by Christopher Idle (b. 1938), a priest in the Church of England and an important voice in modern hymnody.

Calvary 2017 Lent Theological Reading Group

During Lent this year the group will read several works by St. Anselm of Canterbury including the *Monologion*, *Proslogion*, *On the Incarnation of the Word*, and *Why God Became Man*. Anselm was an 11th century monk, abbot, philosopher, theologian, bishop, and eventually Archbishop of Canterbury from 1093 to 1109. Among his main achievements were the development of the ontological argument for the existence of God and the satisfaction theory of atonement, as well as his overall body of work which is regarded as one of the earliest in what became known as the scholastic tradition.



O God, the strength of all who put their trust in you: Mercifully accept our prayers; and because in our weakness we can do nothing good without you, give us the help of your grace, that in keeping your commandments we may please you both in will and deed; through Jesus Christ our LORD, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

A Reading from the Book of Deuteronomy [30:15-20]

Moses said to all Israel the words which the Lord commanded him, "See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the LORD your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the LORD your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the LORD your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the LORD your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the LORD swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob."

A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

{3:1-9}

Brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarreling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apollos," are you not merely human? What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the LORD assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

Reader: The Word of the LORD.

Congregation: Thanks be to God.

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew

{5:21-37}

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny. You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell. It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the LORD.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."

Response after the Gospel: Praise to you, LORD Christ.
