Bach bases all three voices, and particularly the upper two, on motifs drawn from the hymn-tune, but the tune is literally present only briefly, when its two opening appear as the bass-line, in slightly longer notes than the prevailing texture.

The Prelude is one of two organ-trios Bach composed based on *All glory be to God on high* (the paraphrase of the *Gloria in excelsis* which we are singing through this season). This one, in A major, comes from a collection of chorale-based works he compiled in the last decade or so of his life, many or most of which originated decades before, but which he revised to a greater or lesser extent in the 1740s. It is one of three settings of this hymn in that collection, all of them lovely. The texture behaves in a way evocative of the Baroque trio-sonata: two interweaving melodic lines, each played by one hand, on its own keyboard, given harmonic underpinning by a third line consigned to the pedals. Bach bases all three voices, and particularly the upper two, on motifs drawn from the hymn-tune, but the tune is literally present only briefly, when its two opening appear as the bass-line, in slightly longer notes than the prevailing texture.

Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707) was a central member of the so-called North-German Organ School, group of church-based composers whose relatively uniform style spread in a wide radius around Hamburg in the second half of the seventeenth century. The landscape was dotted with large and ever-more elaborate organs (elaborate both inside and out: ostentatiously decorative carvings were a hallmark of the time, and a means of a given church or town asserting its prosperity and importance). These composers stretched these instruments to their limits, expanding the technical expectations for players' finger-work and footwork alike. *Praeludia* like Buxtehude's G minor exemplar, heard as today's Postlude, were large-scale, sometimes rhetorically sophisticated pieces, in which successive sections both contrasted with and developed one another, typically alternating between toccata-style and fugal passages.

Our Organ Scholar, Zacchaeus Lock, and several of his fellow students from Franciscan University, will be presenting a joint organ recital at Heinz Chapel on the Pitt campus next Saturday afternoon, February 25, at 3 p.m. Admission is free, and all are welcome.

Calvary 2017 Lent Theological Reading Group

During Lent this year the group will read several works by St. Anselm of Canterbury including the *Monologion*, *Proslogion*, *On the Incarnation of the Word*, and *Why God Became Man*. Anselm was an 11th century monk, abbot, philosopher, theologian, bishop, and eventually Archbishop of Canterbury from 1093 to 1109. Among his main achievements were the development of the ontological argument for the existence of God and the satisfaction theory of atonement, as well as his overall body of work which is regarded as one of the earliest in what became known as the scholastic tradition.
