



MUSICAL NOTES

Bach's *Prelude and Fugue in B minor* is thought to date from the late 1720s, relatively late among his compositions for the organ. (Despite his reputation, in his own day and since, as a great organist, most of his engagement with writing music for the instrument came early in his life, before his professional responsibilities drew him in other compositional directions.) The Prelude is built as a "ritornello" structure, a series of thematically similar blocks separated by episodes contrasting in motif, texture, and (at least as we hear it this morning) dynamic-level. The Fugue, based on a steady series of eighth-notes, likewise uses episodes of textural and dynamic contrast to create a sense of shape; it is, broadly, an A-B-A structure, with each of those large blocks forged of two or more smaller units.

O Pray for the Peace of Jerusalem is one of a set of four anthems, first published in 1941 under the title "In Time of War." At the time, Howells was deputizing as the Organist of St. John's College, Cambridge, since the regular incumbent had been called up for service; this period effectively redirected Howells's creative energies for the remainder of his life, with music for the Church figuring much more prominently in the post-war years than it had in the previous couple of decades. The plaintive exhortation to pray for peace grows across the piece, developing a sense of confidence and assurance as the text progresses, and then subsiding gently into silence.

NEWCOMERS AND GUESTS are always welcome at Calvary Church. Our service uses the three books located in the pew: *The Book of Common Prayer*, *The Hymnal 1982*, and *Lift Every Voice and Sing II*. Directions in the service bulletin indicate where it is customary to stand or kneel. We invite you to participate as you are able. We hope you will take a moment to read and complete the Welcome Card in the pew, and place it in the offertory plate as it passes.

CHILDREN OF ALL AGES are welcome in worship services. Packets of materials for children are available from the ushers. *Nursery Care available during the 9 a.m. and the 11 a.m. services.* The Infants' and Toddlers' Nursery is downstairs on the Christian Education level.

WEEKLY OFFERING CARDS that say "My gift comes electronically or by mail" can serve as a visible sign of your gift. Look for the purple cards in a basket in the Narthex or by the North Transept door each week, take one, and place it in the offering plate.

Lenten Food Drive for EECM Food Pantry

Lenten Theological Reading Group

For our text this year, the group will be reading *The Scapegoat* by René Girard, one of the most important intellectual thinkers of the late 20th century, who died last year. As the frontispiece notes, in this text Girard “elucidates striking thematic and structural similarities between myths and persecution texts” and uncovers the same collective violence in the Christian Passion. However “Christ breaks the mythic cycle of violence and the sacred and provides the model that has enabled Western culture to demystify its own violence.” **We will continue to meet in the Evans Room from 7–9 p.m. on these Wednesdays: February 24, March 2, 9, and 16.** Copies of the text will be available in the Calvary bookstore. TODAY – Sing a Song of Choir Stalls:

The Meaning and Artistry of their Finials (*join us in the Parish Hall*)

If you have observed the finials on each end of our choir stalls and wondered whom they represent and why they are there, this is the time to explore them in detail with the Architectural History Committee. Starting with Phil Maye's photography, we will explore whom each finial represents (or is thought to represent), a short biographical sketch of these historical figures, their relationship to our music and who carved them.

February 28 – Confirmation at Calvary (*join us in the Refectory*)

Join youth confirmation class leader Laura Marchl and several of the confirmation mentors for a panel discussion about preparing for confirmation, raising young people in the church, and what this sacrament can mean for the life of the congregation as a whole.

Calvary's great East Window features twelve medallions that tell the story of Christ's Passion. Gillian Cannell will discuss the tradition of telling this story in art, from Early Christian manuscripts and mosaics, to Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque paintings, prints, sculpture and stained glass. We will discover some unexpected developments within the tradition and finally assess the uniqueness of our own beautiful window.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, whose glory it is always to have mercy: Be gracious to all who have gone astray from your ways, and bring them again with penitent hearts and steadfast faith to embrace and hold fast the unchangeable truth of your Word, Jesus Christ your Son; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

A Reading from the Book of Genesis [15:1-12, 17-18]

The word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O LORD God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the LORD came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness. Then he said to him, "I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O LORD God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away. As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him. When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."
