





### MUSICAL NOTES

François Couperin (1668-1733) was among the greatest French musicians of his generation. Part of a large musical family, he succeeded his father as organist of the Parisian church of St. Gervais at the age of 19, and later was appointed "organist du Roi" in the royal household. His only published works for the organ appeared in 1690, shortly after his appointment at St. Gervais; they take the form of two cycles of short movements intended to complement the Mass, one for parish-churches, the other for convents. The movements, in line with French convention of the time, take their titles or headings from the sounds on which they were intended to be played: for example, a *Plein Jeu* is a "full" combination of stops, and a *Tierce* is a characteristic sound of the French Baroque organ. The *grands jeux* of the postlude are a full combination with the addition of reed-stops, a sound that is grand indeed.

TODAY – Praying with Merton: Awakening to Action. As part of the ten-day Merton Festival (April 16-26 in the centennial celebration of the influential, relevant author and Trappist monk, Thomas Merton, we'll explore in this Adult Forum some of the impacts on our lives as Merton continues to inspire and mentor each new generation. A member of the Merton Festival planning committee, Carol J. Gonzalez, will consider and facilitate conversation of the journey as disciples of meditation become apostles of love. An educator and contemplative activist, Carol has served on the board of the Thomas Merton Center, editorial collective, and has led numerous Merton and Dorothy Day study groups.

Sunday, April 26 – Thomas Merton on the Contemplative Life. The good news is that we may be more contemplative than we thought. Come to hear about Thomas Merton's definition of "contemplation," what he thinks it isn't and what characterizes the contemplative life. Dr. Bonnie Thurston will the presenter. Bonnie wrote her doctoral dissertation on Thomas Merton and is particularly interested in his poetry and his inter-religious thought. She was a founding member of the International Thomas Merton Society and served as its third president. She has written more than 30 articles on Merton and given retreats and lectured on Merton widely in the U.S., Canada, the U.K. and Europe.

#### THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, whose blessed Son made himself known to his disciples in the breaking of bread: Open the eyes of our faith, that we may behold him in all his redeeming work; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.* 

### A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles [3:12-19]

When Peter saw the astonishment of those who had seen the lame man healed, he addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you. And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

- Answer me when I call, O God, defender of my cause; \* you set me free when I am hard-pressed; have mercy on me and hear my prayer.

### A Reading from the First Letter of John [3:1-7]

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure. Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

Reader: The Word of the LORD. Congregation: Thanks be to God.

### The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Luke [24:36b-48]

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

While the disciples were telling how they had seen Jesus risen from the dead, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you – that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."
