## *Concerning the Great Vigil of Easter*

*The Great Vigil of Easter is one of the Church's most ancient rites, and one whose layers of meaning are many and deep. It begins with the kindling of fire, perhaps the most primitive possible gesture of community. We then recall, through the prophetic readings, God's promise of salvation. We then gather at the Baptismal Font, both to initiate new members and to renew our own baptismal covenant; finally, proclaiming Christ's triumph over death, we celebrate the Eucharist, encountering the risen Christ's abiding presence with us.*

### ***Musical Notes***

Edward Cuthbert Bairstow was Organist of York Minster from 1913-46, and one of the finest composers of his generation of church musicians; many of his works continue in use, few more so than the great Easter anthem “Sing ye to the Lord.” The opening fanfare, echoing the opening line of the Song of Moses and Miriam at the end of tonight’s Exodus reading, returns for the closing “Alleluias.” These fanfares frame an interior based on a stanza from the familiar Easter hymn, “At the Lamb’s high feast we sing,” its setting by turns triumphant and lyrical.

Children of all ages are welcome in worship services. Packets of materials for children are available from the ushers.

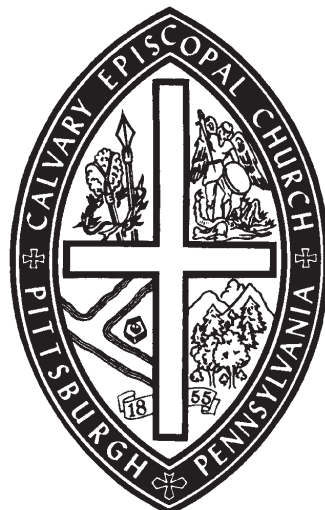
