## MUSICAL NOTES

This morning we welcome world-renowned organist and choral-conductor Martin Neary to Calvary. Dr. Neary has been the chief musician at Winchester Cathedral and at Westminster Abbey, two of the Anglican Communion's most celebrated musical venues, and he has commissioned and premiered numerous important choral works. Since his departure from the Abbey in 1998, he has been a welcome visitor on both sides of the Atlantic, performing and building fruitful relationships with choirs across the United States. This afternoon at 4 p.m., he will play the annual Donald C McVay recital, to which parishioners are offered free admission (see Alan Lewis for a ticket at coffee hour).

Psalm 100 (often called the Jubilate Deo, after the Latin form of its opening words) has long been associated with the office of Morning Prayer. Its jubilant text makes it appropriate at almost any time, and particularly on this "Good Shepherd" Sunday. The setting by Herbert Howells (1892-1983) was composed for the choir of King's College Cambridge. Howells had spent most of World War II deputizing for the organist of the neighboring college, St. John's. The connections Howells established during those years rekindled his enthusiasm for church-music, a genre which he had more or less neglected since ill health forced him to give up a post at Salisbury Cathedral in his twenties. A stunningly beautiful evening service he composed for King's College in 1945 catapulted Howells to the forefront of Anglican choral composition, a prominence he enjoyed for the rest of his career. A Morning Service for King's (today's Jubilate and its companion-canticle, a Te Deum) soon followed, to complement the Evening Service; it was published in 1950.

As the scholar Marion Hatchett observes: "Confession is the obverse of thanksgiving; to give thanks for redemption is to acknowledge one's sinfulness." In this Eastertide, we give thanks to God for the mercy and forgiveness declared to us by Christ's victory over sin and death.

The recipients are usually local charities from the East End of Pittsburgh, and many support the needs of women and children in our extended neighborhood. Last year, the Women of Calvary awarded \$17,000 to these worthy organizations. The 2013 Holiday Bazaar will be held on **Saturday, November 9.**

## Big Brothers Big Sisters



Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Pittsburgh is a non-profit serving nearly 1,200 children facing adversity, by providing strong and enduring professionally supported one-to-one relationships. WOC's grant of \$500 supports the "Mentoring Children of Prisoners" program.

## Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)



Allegheny County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) train community volunteers who work with the child welfare system to advocate for the best interest of abused and neglected children. WOC's grant of \$1,000 provides support for one child for one year.

## Calvary-Lincoln After School Program (CLASP)



CLASP is an arts enrichment program for boys and girls in grades 3-5. Children from Calvary Church and Lincoln Elementary Technical Academy participate together to build new friendships, play together and learn together. WOC's grant of \$3,750 supports 10 Lincoln students to attend Calvary Camp.

## East End Cooperative Ministry (EECM)



EECM is an inter-faith coalition of 49 congregations united to minister to the human needs of Pittsburgh's East End. EECM's mission is to join together as a racially and culturally diverse people of faith to build a loving, healthy and economically vital community in the East End of Pittsburgh. Calvary is one of the founding congregations of EECM.

WOC's grant of \$500 supports their antiviolence youth programs.

## Good Grief Center



The Good Grief Center is a comprehensive bereavement resource and referral center that builds a more compassionate community through grief awareness, education, support and hope. WOC's grant of \$500 supports the "Daughters Without Mothers" support group.

## GWEN'S GIRLS

Gwen's Girls was founded by a retired commander of the Pittsburgh Police Bureau, to provide gender-specific education and experiences to empower girls ages 8 to 18, to have productive, self-sufficient futures. WOC's grant of \$500 helps to cover the cost of clothing stipends for the Job Readiness Program.

## Holy Cross Church



The Episcopal Church of the Holy Cross in Homewood is a sister church of Calvary, and as such, we support them in carrying out their mission as a place of sanctuary and blessings in the East End. WOC's grant of \$1,500, matched this year by the Vestry, enabled Holy Cross Church to purchase a new commercial refrigerator/freezer.

## Homeless Children's Education Fund (HCEF)



The HCEF is a non-profit agency solely dedicated to providing educational opportunities and experiences for children and youth residing in 16 of Allegheny County's homeless shelters. WOC's grant of \$750 supports the Service Access for Youth initiative, providing direct service programs for the homeless children and youth.

## Jubilee Association



Originally begun as the Jubilee Soup Kitchen, for over 30 years the Jubilee Association serves countless homeless and near-homeless with meals, medical clinic, pantry services and assistance in social services such as housing and healthcare. WOC's grant of \$500 supports the "Pantry on Polish Hill" providing take home food for families and the elderly.

## Lydia's Place



Lydia's Place is a non-profit, faith-based organization dedicated to helping incarcerated women and their children rebuild their lives and become productive members of society. WOC's grant of \$500 helps to provide the funds for identification and transportation for newly released women.

## Oasis Recovery Center



The Oasis Recovery Center helps individuals and families recover from alcohol, drug and other addictions, such as gambling. These addictions result in 250 deaths each year in Allegheny County. WOC's grant of \$750 supports Oasis' educational and grief groups.

## Off the Floor Pittsburgh



Off the Floor is a local Christian ministry dedicated to supporting families who cannot afford basic furniture for their homes. They delivered needed furniture to over 550 families, helping a total of 1,100 children. The organization does not have "office space" but coordinates activities among the participating churches/ organizations. WOC's grant of \$500 supports the redesign of the OFP website.

## Pittsburgh Pastoral Institute (PPI)



The Pittsburgh Pastoral Institute is Western Pennsylvania's oldest interfaith counseling center providing mental health services to over 1400 persons annually. The WOC grant of \$1,000 supports the Silent Samaritan program, which provides funds to help over 200 women who need PPI's counseling services, but who cannot afford the full fee.

## St. Stephen's Neighborhood Youth Outreach Program (NYOP)



NYOP has been offering a safe place for children in Wilkinsburg for nearly 17 years, providing an arts program and homework help along with dinner. Music is the centerpiece of the program. WOC's grant of \$700, matched by the Vestry, provided a new digital keyboard to support NYOP's music program.

## Shepherd Wellness Community



Shepherd Wellness Community is the only AIDS community in Western Pennsylvania, offering a safe, compassionate community empowering people affected by HIV/AIDS to live with dignity. WOC's grant of \$750 helps to provide community and family meals and other programs serving the SWC members and their families.

## Calvary Clergy Discretionary Fund



Throughout the year, our clergy minister to and counsel many people, and support a myriad of pastoral needs. The Women of Calvary's grant of \$3,000 provides monetary support to the clergy for the unanticipated needs of those who come to them for solace and support.

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the LORD. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.


**The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to John**
