At the altar rail, kneel or stand, with hands cupped one on top of the other, to receive the consecrated bread. Please guide the chalice containing the wine to your lips. If you do not wish to receive directly from the chalice, you may dip a portion of the wafer carefully into the wine, or you may simply cross your arms over your chest as the Chalice Bearer passes. Parents are encouraged to bring children to receive Communion or a blessing.

Those not wishing to receive Communion may come forward for a blessing. Gluten free wafers are available upon request at the pulpit station.

After receiving Communion, those who would like to receive laying on of hands and prayers for healing may go to the altar rail in the Lady Chapel.

MUSICAL NOTES

Thursday was Ascension Day, and that theme echoes in today's Collect, anthems, and hymnody. The verses from Psalm 24, "Lift up your heads, O ye gates..." heard at the Introit and Offertory, are often associated with the Ascension (and seem to represent, in the libretto of Handel's *Messiah*, both the Resurrection and Ascension). Howard Chandler Robbins wrote the text of the hymn at the Gospel procession; it weaves together the themes of transcendence and immanence that are central to Anglican worship. And the Byrd motet heard at Communion recalls the Collect's plea: "do not leave us comfortless," drawn from the passage in John's Gospel in which Jesus foretells his departure from the disciples in the Upper Room.



Today's voluntaries comprise a set of "Three Preludes Founded on Welsh Hymn Tunes," published in 1920. Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) was the son of a Church of England cleric, and the great-nephew of Charles Darwin. Of Welsh extraction himself, and a dedicated collector of folksong and other music of the oral tradition, he incorporated a number of Welsh hymns into *The English Hymnal* of 1906, a landmark publication for which he was the music-editor. His treatments of these three Welsh melodies are, by turns, powerful and lyrical. The setting of *Bryn Calfaria*

(literally, *The Hill of Calvary*, sung as our final hymn today) opens the set, and evokes an improvisatory toccata; *Rhosymedre* is gently and graciously melodic; *Hyfrydol* undergirds the beloved melody with streams of parallel-motion chords and occasional syncopations, suggesting (for some) the surging of the sea.

On Pentecost, Calvary Church has the custom of reading the Gospel of the day simultaneously in as many languages as possible. The sound of many languages recalls for us the experience of the disciples and the crowd on that first Pentecost following the Resurrection. We invite anyone who knows a language other than English to read the Gospel in that language at the 9 a.m. or 11 a.m services. When the Gospel is announced, all will begin to read at the same time in their various languages. (Even if you are a bit shy or not overly confident of perfect pronunciation, you can add your voice to the mix.) The Gospel reading for Pentecost is from the Gospel of John, chapter 15, verses 26–27 and chapter 16, verses 4b–15. Thank you for helping us celebrate this festival of the Holy Spirit! (There will be a celebration of Holy Baptism on Pentecost Sunday at the 11 a.m. service.)

Sunday, May 17 – The Spiritual Care of Veterans and Their Families. Some of the most difficult wounds to heal are not those that are physical but those that are emotional and spiritual. Moved by God's love, the church is in a unique position to provide both the context and catalyst in ministering to veterans and their families. This will be a discussion with The Rev. The Seventh Sunday of Easter: The Sunday after Ascension Day

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: Do not leave us comfortless, but send us your Holy Spirit to strengthen us, and exalt us to that place where our Savior Christ has gone before; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. *Amen*.

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles [1:15-17, 21-26]

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus—for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the LORD Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us — one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "LORD, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

Reader: The Word of the LORD. Congregation: Thanks be to God.

- Happy are they who have not walked in the counsel of the wicked, * nor lingered in the way of sinners, nor sat in the seats of the scornful!

And this is the testimony: God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life. I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

Reader: The Word of the LORD. Congregation: Thanks be to God.

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to John [17:6-19]

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

Jesus prayed for his disciples saying, "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. While I was with them, I protected them in your name that you have given me. I guarded them, and not one of them was lost except the one destined to be lost, so that the scripture might be fulfilled. But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth.
