

THE HOLY COMMUNION

CELEBRANT: The Lord be with you.

Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made. In the fullness of time bring us, with {_____ and} all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world.





4th of July Facts

- Calvin Coolidge, the 30th president, was born July 4 in 1872. Three presidents died on the 4th of July: John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe. The second president, Adams, and the third, Jefferson, both died in 1826, the 50th anniversary.
- Most of the Founding Fathers agreed that July 4th is the correct day to celebrate America's independence from Great Britain – except one. John Adams thought July 2, the day the Second Continental Congress voted in Philadelphia to declare independence from Britain, would be the day patriots celebrated.
- The 4th of July became a legal federal holiday in 1870. Then, in 1938, Congress reaffirmed the holiday to make sure all workers received full pay.
- America isn't the only nation that celebrates the 4th of July. It might sound odd, but you still might see fireworks in Denmark, England, Norway, Portugal and Sweden. This is because thousands of people emigrated to the U.S. in the early 1900s. Some European celebrations on the 4th take place near tourist destinations (to attract U.S. travelers) or near American military bases.
- *The Pennsylvania Evening Post* in Philadelphia was the first newspaper to print the Declaration of Independence, on Saturday, July 6, 1776. It was the second publication in any form, and the first to closely follow Thomas Jefferson's style.



MUSICAL NOTES

The *Prélude et Fugue sur le nom d'A.L.A.I.N.* is written as an *hommage* to the young Jehan Alain, whose life was tragically taken away at age 29 in an accident while he was away fighting for his country. This summer of 2016, we also commemorate 30 years since the death of French organist and composer, Maurice Duruflé (1902–1986). Duruflé was hesitant to identify Alain as free-spirited, optimistic, and happy, and instead identifies him as serious and introverted in this piece. The *Prélude* is exuberant and scherzo-like in character, contrasting with the melancholy beginning of the fugue. Each note of the fugue subject designates a letter that spells the name A.L.A.I.N. The energetic fugue crescendoes incrementally to a dazzling and breathtaking conclusion.

This program is a part of Opera Theater's SummerFest, which draws singers from around the globe for a three week festival running from July 7–24. Based at the beautifully renovated Falk Auditorium at the Winchester Thurston School in Shadyside, SummerFest has something for everyone: Cole Porter's timeless classic *Kiss Me, Kate*, Handel's masterpiece *Julius Caesar*, Strauss' rarely-performed *The Silent Woman*, Bizet's passionate love story *Carmen*, Barab's children's opera *Little Red Riding Hood*, as well as a host of recitals, concerts, and cabarets – including the evening at Calvary. Altar Flower Delivery Volunteers Needed

One of Calvary's oldest ministries is the delivery of the flowers that grace the High Altar each Sunday morning to members of our congregation who need to know of Calvary's care and concern for them. The flowers become an "outward and visible sign" that the congregation is thinking about them as they experience loss or sorrow, illness and recovery – or is rejoicing with them at happy times such as the birth of a child or a special anniversary.



Many of our Altar Flower Delivery Volunteers have been a part of this outreach ministry for over 30 years. They still volunteer for one or two Sundays a quarter, because they know what joy these flowers bring to those who receive them. These faithful volunteers can also recount meaningful experiences they have had with the flower recipients during their brief visits in hospitals and homes.

With retirements and moves away, we need to add several new volunteers to our ranks to be able continue to carry on this important ministry. The volunteer delivery schedule for the months of July, August and September is being put together now. We hope that you will consider becoming one of us this summer, or perhaps you would prefer to begin in the 4th Quarter (October, November and December). The time commitment for the delivery of altar flowers is approximately one to two hours after the 11 o'clock service once, or at most twice, a quarter (instructions and directions are provided).

Psalm 66:1-8

- 1 Be joyful in God, all you lands; *

A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Galatians [6:(1-6) 7-16]

[My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbor's work, will become a cause for pride. For all must carry their own loads. Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.] Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith. See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised – only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our LORD Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Luke

[10:1-11, 16-20]

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

The LORD appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the LORD of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.' "Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me." The seventy returned with joy, saying, "LORD, in your name even the demons submit to us!" He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."
