MUSICAL NOTES

Jehan Alain (1911-40) was a promising organist and composer, lost in the early years of World War II. Thanks to the editorial labors of his sister, the internationally acclaimed organist Marie-Claire Alain, his surviving works were published and have established him as a promising voice in the musical landscape of the inter-War years. The *Ballade* is an attractive piece in three sections: the opening and closing ones are duets between a reed-stop (Oboe, and later Clarinet) and gentle flutes; the middle section (the portion actually alluding to the Phrygian mode, with a characteristic half-step above the tonic note in the scale—D-E flat-F-G-A) is hymn-like, on a sound vaguely evoking human song. The brief Choral Cistercien is a very gentle piece, hymn-like and ethereal.



MUSICAL NOTES

William Byrd and Henry Purcell were, in their respective generations, the preeminent English musicians of the day. Byrd (1543-1623) gravitated from rural Lincolnshire to the capital at an early age, and was soon taken to the very center of the musical establishment, the orbit of the Chapel Royal. Together with his older colleague Thomas Tallis, Byrd was granted a royal patent (effectively, a monopoly) for the printing of music, a technology new to England in their time, which contributed to his prominence. The Introit today comes from a collection printed by Byrd in 1591 (after Tallis's death); it is a setting for five voices of the opening verse of today's Gradual Psalm.

Purcell (1659-1695), coming of age during the restoration of the monarchy after the English Civil War, grew up in a musical culture much depleted by the recent conflict. Church and Cathedral musical establishments were in tatters, and the patterns for the training of young treble voices were some years in the rebuilding. Purcell and his contemporaries presided over that rebuilding, and what proved to be a great flowering of musical culture both in the Church and in secular venues. Like some of the music of Byrd's day, the English sacred music of the late-seventeenth-century often strove for dramatic musical underscoring of textual meaning. The low sonorities opening *Lord, how long* are illustrative of this, as is the contrasting jubilation of the closing section.

Thanks to the editorial labors of his sister, the internationally acclaimed organist Marie-Claire Alain, his surviving works were published and have established him as a promising voice in the musical landscape of the inter-War years. The *Ballade* is an attractive piece in three sections: the opening and closing ones are duets between a reed-stop (Oboe, and later Clarinet) and gentle flutes; the middle section (the portion actually alluding to the Phrygian mode, with a characteristic half-step above the tonic note in the scale—D-E flat-F-G-A) is hymn-like, on a sound vaguely evoking human song. The brief Choral Cistercien is a very gentle piece, hymn-like and ethereal. The music for *O salutaris hostia* is the gift of Ellen and Phil Maye; it is an understated and beautiful choral setting of a hymn-text associated with the Eucharist, and with the rite of Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

September 22 – The Conversation We COULD Be Having

J.G. Boccella is a social-change catalyst, recording artist, and founder of ConversationWe.com. He will share his insight about how a simple paradigm shift could have a profound effect on race relations. How – by engaging each person’s “whole humanity” – we can move beyond narrowly defined roles, to a place of far greater understanding, connection, and relationship. J.G. holds a B.A. in visual art from Brown University and a master’s degree in education from Harvard.

Coming: November 3 – *Harry Potter and the Gospel*

John Fetterman, our theologian in residence, welcomes Harry Potter fans of all ages to this intergenerational discussion. Some key issues in the stories, especially the first book, *The Sorcerer’s Stone* will be addressed. The topics will include the problem of evil (What’s fair?); salvation (What’s it take?) and grace (How in the world?).

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, because without you we are not able to please you, mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ our LORD, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

A Reading from the Book of Exodus [32:7-14]

The LORD said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" The LORD said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation." But Moses implored the LORD his God, and said, "O LORD, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, 'I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it forever.'" And the LORD changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our LORD, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our LORD overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners – of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Luke

{15:1-10}

Response before the Gospel: Glory to you, LORD Christ.

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, “This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.” So he told them this parable: “Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, ‘Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.’ Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance. “Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbors, saying, ‘Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.’ Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.”
