





MUSICAL NOTES

A warm welcome to the instrumentalists joining us this morning. Since 1990, Chatham Baroque has been delighting critics and audiences in Pittsburgh and across the country with their spirited performances of seventeenth- and eighteenth-century music. They have been Calvary's ensemble-in-residence for ten years. And trumpeters Charles Lirette and Rick Murrell have adorned festive occasions here for many years, as well.

Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707) seems to have delighted in the particular combination of sounds represented by Chatham Baroque, for he composed a wealth of sonatas specifically for violin, viola da gamba, and continuo. One of his only published volumes of music was a collection of sonatas for just these forces, from which today's Prelude comes. The piece is built as a set of 31 variations over a repeating bassline. The violin takes the lead initially, giving way briefly to the gamba, and then sharing with it in elegant interplay between high and low solo lines.

The Offertory music pairs two choruses from the oratorios of Handel. "Let all the angels of God" is one of the less-frequently-heard moments from *Messiah*, a brief but jubilant exhortation to the heavenly chorus adore the risen and ascended Christ. The similarly joyous "Let their celestial concerts all unite" is another appeal to the angelic host to adoration. It forms the conclusion of *Samson*, an oratorio which Handel began composing in 1741, finishing Act One just days after completing his work on *Messiah*. (While much is often made of the breakneck speed at which Handel composed *Messiah*, in a span of just over three weeks, *Samson*, a work of similarly imposing proportions, took him only a fortnight longer!)

The two angel-themed pieces at Communion are by the English composer Richard Dering (c. 1580-1630). Despite sharing a composer, they are rather different in their scoring: *Factum est silentium* is for six-voice choir, while *Duo seraphim* is set for only two voices. Dering, as a Roman Catholic, exiled himself from Anglican England for most of his adult life, but returned in 1625 as organist of the Catholic chapel of Queen Henrietta Maria, the wife of Charles I.

After a review of their appearance in our worship, we’ll trace their presence through scripture and consider their relevance to our lives of prayer. Dr. Bonnie Thurston will be our presenter.

October 6 – Arab Spring: What Happened and What’s Next. Tarek and Pamela Abdalla and their family lived for 3 1/2 years in the United Arab Emirates. Come hear him talk about the Arab world and the causes of its conflicts and how that relates to the Islamic religion. This critical region of our world is rapidly changing on a daily basis. Learn how these changes began and what could be next for these vital global relationships.

Coming: November 3 – **Harry Potter and the Gospel**

John Fetterman, our theologian in residence, welcomes Harry Potter fans of all ages to this intergenerational discussion. Some key issues in the stories, especially the first book, *The Sorcerer’s Stone* will be addressed. The topics will include the problem of evil (What’s fair?); salvation (What’s it take?) and grace (How in the world?).



CROP Hunger Walk Tips for fundraising success

-  **Set a challenging goal.** A good place to start is at \$150 – but don't hesitate to raise your goal as you near that mark!
-  **Start early.** Get your donation envelope from your Walk recruiter – and ask sponsors for their donations as they're filling out their info on the form.
-  **Maximize your efforts.** Create your own online donation page at crophungerwalk.org.
 - ▶ *Make it personal.* Tell why you've chosen to walk. Share inspiring photos and videos about how you're helping fight hunger.
 - ▶ *Schedule separate emails to:*
 - Announce** the Walk and ask for donations,
 - Update** sponsors and prospects with your goal status,
 - Appeal** for "last-chance" donations,
 - Report** your results and **personally thank** those who've supported you.
 - ▶ *Reach out to all your online contacts,* using the fundraising tools at crophungerwalk.org or your own email. Post status updates and link to your donation page through Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn and other sites. Make sure to add your fundraising page link to your email signature.
-  **Make your message simple.** "I'm walking in the CROP Hunger Walk to help end hunger. Will you sponsor me?"
-  **Ask everyone to support you.** Friends, neighbors, relatives, people in your congregation/school/workplace. It's simple: ask more people, raise more money, help more people in need.
-  **Get creative.** Give out jars for people to save their change in for a month. Ask friends to sponsor your child or pet, who's also "supporting the Walk." Throw a party, hold an auction – use your imagination!
