



MUSICAL NOTES


Johann Sebastian Bach's six sonatas for the organ seem to have been composed as technique-builders for his most advanced students, studies that simultaneously challenge and stimulate dexterity and musicality. Their texture – three voices, one for each hand, one shared by the feet – mimics that of the garden-variety Baroque instrumental trio-sonata, but with everything assigned to a single player. Thus the two hands play interlocking and complementary melody lines, often imitating one another in the development of musical motifs; the feet both participate in this imitation, and also furnish the harmonic foundation that glues the texture together into coherence.

MUSICAL NOTES

Johann Sebastian Bach's six sonatas for the organ seem to have been composed as technique-builders for his most advanced students, studies that simultaneously challenge and stimulate dexterity and musicality. Their texture – three voices, one for each hand, one shared by the feet – mimics that of the garden-variety Baroque instrumental trio-sonata, but with everything assigned to a single player. Thus the two hands play interlocking and complementary melody lines, often imitating one another in the development of musical motifs; the feet both participate in this imitation, and also furnish the harmonic foundation that glues the texture together into coherence.

Today's Introit was prompted, in part, by the poem by Dr. Samuel M. Shoemaker, Calvary's 12th Rector, lately placed on permanent display in the Narthex. Its recurrent theme, "I stand by the door," arises from a verse of today's Psalm (sadly, a verse not included in the excerpt assigned by the Lectionary today): "I had rather be a doorkeeper in the house of the Lord than to dwell in the tents of ungodliness." (The display of that poem, ingeniously contrived for us by Fred Roth and Ken Smith, incorporates a handsome panel of Calvary's old organ-console, decorated with carvings echoing those of the Rood Screen.)

Today's Offertory Anthem is the central movement of Johannes Brahms' monumental *German Requiem*. The whole of that work is based, not on the traditional Requiem liturgy, but on an array of Biblical texts carefully chosen by the composer as he compiled a complex reflection upon mortality. The text of this movement comes, again, from today's Psalm. The gentlest and most lightly-scored portion of the Requiem, it marks a turning point from the anxiety and pain of the previous movements, to reflect upon the promise of eternity in the heavenly habitations.

A Study on the Book of Acts

The class on the Book of Acts meets in McClintic Hall (choir room) at 10 a.m. each week. It is led by the Rev. Jonathon Jensen and Mr. Chuck Esposito. The only text we are using is the actual book of the Bible itself which is 28 chapters.

TODAY – A Study on the Book of Acts (*in McClintic Hall*)

Sunday, October 30 – A New/Old Requiem

The music for this year's Commemoration of All Souls, on Friday, November 4, is a seldom-heard setting of the Requiem Mass by a seventeenth-century Austro-Bohemian composer, Heinrich Ignaz Franz Biber. In this forum, Alan Lewis explores the lush and glorious music of this piece, and the Imperial context that inspired it, in preparation for the following Friday's musical liturgy.

Sunday, November 6 – Creating a Rule of Life

Monastic wisdom had much to offer us in our efforts to lead balanced, spiritually grounded lives. Informed by the work of the brothers of the Society of St. John the Evangelist, Leslie Reimer will look at how individuals can create and use a rule of life.

Sunday, November 13 – Intercessory Prayer

I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."
