



Musical Notes

Of the three-hundred-or-so motets composed by the Italian Renaissance composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (c. 1525-94) none has a wider familiarity in our day than the four-voice *Sicut cervus*, a setting of the opening verse of Psalm 42. Its elegant, arching musical lines, imitated from one voice to the next through the texture, phrase by phrase, are perfect exemplars of this composer's artistry and skill. The longing suggested by the deftly-placed suspensions in the closing section (*anima mea ad te Deus*) is especially effective.

Craig Phillips (b. 1961) has served All Saints Episcopal Church in Beverly Hills, California, for many years, and has been the Director of Music there since 2009. He is among the most sought-after composers serving the Church today, with many commissions of both choral and organ music to his credit. This morning's Communion music, a setting of a lovely poem printed as Hymn 585 in *The Hymnal 1982*, was commissioned by the Association of Anglican Musicians for its national conference in 2006; the *Trumpet Tune* dates from the early 1990s. (The latter showcases the newly restored Trompette-en-Chamade stop, the horizontally-mounted pipes in the West Gallery.)


