MUSICAL NOTES

The *Te Deum* is one of the earliest surviving canticles of the Christian Church. Its text appears at pp. 52 and 95 in *The Book of Common Prayer*. Its origin is attributed, by pious legend, to a kind of improvisatory duet between Sts. Augustine and Ambrose. It has inspired many musical settings over the centuries, both choral and instrumental; the Prelude today is from the instrumental introduction to a concerted setting by the French baroque composer Marc-Antoine Charpentier, and the Postlude is excerpted from an extended setting for organ alone by Charpentier's Danish-German contemporary, Buxtehude.

At the altar rail, kneel or stand, with hands cupped one on top of the other, to receive the consecrated bread. Please guide the chalice containing the wine to your lips. If you do not wish to receive directly from the chalice, you may dip a portion of the wafer carefully into the wine, or you may simply cross your arms over your chest as the Chalice Bearer passes.

Parents are encouraged to bring children to receive Communion or a blessing. Those not wishing to receive Communion may come forward for a blessing. Gluten free wafers are available upon request at the pulpit station

MUSICAL NOTES

The liturgical life of medieval England was conducted according to the “Use of Sarum,” the body of texts and customs defined by the practices in the Diocese of Salisbury (whose Latin name was “Sarum”). In broad outlines, it corresponded with what one would’ve found anywhere in catholic Christendom, but, like other national or local “Uses,” it is also full of eccentricities. With the English Reformation, all of that was effectively swept away, replaced by the norms of the *Book of Common Prayer*. The modern rediscovery of Sarum documents began in the late nineteenth century, and the exploration of their implications continues still. The choice of English translations of Sarum antiphons for a number of Healey Willan’s liturgical pieces reflects both the interest these documents sparked in liturgical circles, and Willan’s own interest in the catholic heritage of Anglican worship. *O King all glorious* is a brief, unaccompanied piece in four voices; it was first published in 1928.

Edgar L. Bainton (1880-1956) was born in London, and trained at the Royal College of Music. He taught for some years at the Conservatory in Newcastle (years interrupted by four years in a German prison-camp during World War I), and, in his fifties, emigrated to Australia to teach in a newly founded conservatory there. *And I saw a new heaven* is easily his best-known work, an effective setting of verses from Revelation well-suited to All Saints’ Sunday.

Tomás Luis de Victoria (1548-1611) was the best-known of several Spanish composers who made their fame (and to a lesser extent their fortune) in Rome in the sixteenth century. Like many of his musical peers, he was ordained a priest, and held a variety of musical positions in Rome before returning to his native land to serve a musician and chaplain to the Dowager Emperess at Madrid.

In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. I have heard of your faith in the LORD Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our LORD Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.
