MUSICAL NOTES

We welcome oboist Scott Bell, playing the Prelude this morning. Scott holds the Mr. & Mrs. William E. Rinehart endowed oboe chair with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, of which he has been a member since 1992. Scott trained at the Cleveland Institute of Music; he now teaches at Duquesne University and Carnegie Mellon University, and has performed on every continent except Antarctica. He and other members of the orchestra, whose strike continues, are offering a free public concert this afternoon at 3 p.m. at the beautiful Carnegie Library auditorium in Homewood.

Calvary parishioner John W. Becker composed the music heard at Communion as part of a group of anthems by several composers commissioned by Jim Cassaro and the Architectural History Committee in 2009. It sets a beautiful passage from the Book of Wisdom often associated with All Saints' and All Souls Days.

Jean Langlais (1907-91) was one of the most prolific and respected organist-composers of the twentieth-century. Based at the Parisian basilica of Ste-Clothilde for over forty years, he performed for many years internationally, including several appearances in Pittsburgh from the early 1960s forward. The Postlude today is one of a set of three pieces based on Gregorian Chant themes, in this case that of the Te Deum Laudamus, an ancient song of praise associated with festal occasions such as All Saints' Day. (The Te Deum appears in the *Book of Common Prayer* at page 52; the chant setting upon which Langlais based this piece appears in Service Music section of *The Hymnal 1982* at S 282; the Te Deum is also the inspiration for the three lancets in the North Transept, which may be read from left to right and top to bottom as a visual representation of the text.

John Gillespie Magee (1884-1953)

John Gillespie Magee, Sr. was born in Pittsburgh, PA on October 10, 1884 to a notable Pittsburgh family, the son of Frederick M. and Hannah Gillespie Magee. He attended Shady Side Academy, the Hotchkiss School, and then Yale University, graduating in 1906. At Yale, Magee was a member of the Freshman Religious Committee (1901), Sophomore Class deacon (1903), and Vice President of Dwight Hall, the center for religious activity at Yale (1906). From 1908 to 1910 Magee served as General Secretary of Dwight Hall. He spent the summer of 1909 as a missionary among the Winnebago Indians in Nebraska under the sponsorship of the Dutch Reformed Church. After receiving his B.D. from the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1911, he spent the fall of 1911 visiting colleges on behalf of the Student Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions.



Magee was ordained as a minister of the Episcopal Church and appointed to be a missionary in China in 1912, stationed in Nanking [Nanjing]. While in China he met his wife, Faith Emmeline Backhouse, an English missionary serving under the Church Missionary Society. They were married in July 1921 and subsequently raised four sons: John, David, Christopher, and Hugh. When Japanese soldiers invaded Nanking in December 1937, Magee remained in Nanking as a member of the International Safety Zone Committee, which arranged with the Japanese for a section of the city not to be destroyed. As the Japanese soldiers perpetrated atrocities against the people of Nanking, John G. Magee worked tirelessly to save and protect the people he could. During this time he risked his own life to film and document the war crimes carried out by the Japanese soldiers. In 1938, he was able to smuggle these films out of China providing evidence of the Nanking Massacre. Upon his return to the United States in 1940, Magee became the Curate of St. John's Church in Washington, DC, leaving in 1945 to become the chaplain to Episcopal students at Yale University from 1946 to 1953. Magee was serving as Assistant Rector of Calvary Episcopal Church in Pittsburgh, PA when he died following a heart attack on September 11, 1953.

Next Sunday, November 13, will mark the date of the fall UTO offering at Calvary, for which the blue envelopes will be provided in your service bulletin. Please express your thankfulness by giving generously at that day's offertory, or at any convenient time in the future. Checks may be made out to Calvary and designated on the memo line for UTO.



The charitable reach of UTO extends from our own neighborhood to our domestic heartland and to many communities abroad. In addition, its grants – both modest and substantial – to God's people around the world are awarded to “alleviate poverty, enable new and innovative projects, transform unjust social structures and make a significant impact.” A program of The Episcopal Church, UTO was founded by women in 1889 and administered by women since then for the mission of the whole church. As such, it is both a spiritual and financial partner in the church's mission, and it works through the generosity of individuals throughout our own diocese and dioceses throughout the country. At our parish, the UTO drive is administered by Women of Calvary.

UTO awarded 32 grants this year for a total of more than a million and a half dollars to both U.S. and non-domestic dioceses. Many of these grants involve environmental projects including a recycling center in Alabama, a solar panel project in the Dominican Republic, and a project to protect sustainable practices for water and harvest in the Diocese of Navajoland.

A Study on the Book of Acts
