




MUSICAL NOTES

LITURGICAL & MUSICAL NOTES

In the Lectionary, or schedule of readings for liturgical use across the Church-year, the week (or weeks) between All Saints' Day and the end of the liturgical year on the Sunday before Advent begins generally confronts us with texts that are apocalyptic, looking at ominous signs and portents suggesting the End Times. The current Lectionary-cycle, Year C, is no exception; today's readings from Malachi and Luke point toward the cataclysm anticipated by the early Church, and by many generations of Christians since.

The poem attributed to the sixth-century Irish monk and saint, Columba, and set to music by Benjamin Britten as today's anthem, reflects a similar apocalyptic outlook. Indeed, Columba's time, probably as much as any era since the time of Jesus, was one full of "wars and rumors of wars," with grave threats to the very fabric of civilization looming on every side. Britten's setting dates from 1962, when the shadow of global strategic conflict was dark indeed; as a committed pacifist, Britten was surely sensitive to that shadow, and its implications for a modern reading of this medieval text. A relentlessly repeated alternation between two adjacent notes (usually very low, sometimes higher) seems to menace the musical texture during the first stanza of the hymn, at once irrespective of the text declaimed by the choir, and deeply expressive of the poem's anxious meaning. In the second stanza, dissonant evocations of lightning from the organ underscore the text. And in the third, a softer ethos prevails, briefly, evoking the peace promised in the text; here, the oscillating motif of the opening section moves into a more soothing treble range. Britten brings the piece to a close with a brief and stormy return to the opening phrase of the text, and then a gradual restoration of calm.

The Postlude is Britten's only significant organ piece, a work based on a short phrase from the opening of a motet by the Spanish Renaissance composer Tomás Luis de Victoria. The brief Prelude presents a kind of fantasy on that short motto; the fugue develops the motif contrapuntally, beginning and ending very softly, with a large build-up along the way.

The Rev. John Magee, a native son of Calvary, served as a missionary in China from 1912-1938 and was instrumental in saving 100,000 Chinese from death at the hands of the Japanese Imperial Army. Amazingly, his story was lost to us until a Chinese documentary filmmaker visited Calvary last year.
