

LITURGICAL & MUSICAL NOTES

The Biblical book of Psalms (often styled “The Psalms of David,” after their traditional attribution to the great Biblical king and harp-player), unlike most of the Hebrew Bible, is made up entirely of poetry. That these 150 poems originated in so different a language, and so different a culture, has often made its translation into later forms and languages very complex. (Some Psalms, for example, are structured as acrostics, in which the initial letters of successive verses are organized according to a particular plan; this is almost always lost in translation, as are innumerable structural details, to say nothing of imagery and references that have lost currency.)

Yet still, the Psalter (as the collection is often called) has deep resonances, both as poetry and, especially, as a repository of spiritual riches. Its recitation makes up a significant part of the Church’s forms for daily prayer (the “offices,” or services, of morning and evening prayer typically read through the entire Psalter on a four- or a six-week cycle), and is an important part of the Eucharistic rite. It is also a valuable resource for anyone’s arsenal of inspiration for prayer and contemplation.

One way of grappling with the challenge of translation has been to paraphrase the archaic poetry of the Psalms into something that will seem more “poetic” to modern eyes and ears. Since the sixteenth century, the poetic paraphrase of psalms into rhyming poetry following some recognizable metrical pattern has been pursued in various languages, English among them. Martin Luther, the great German architect of the Reformation, was a strong proponent of such paraphrases; one of his best-known efforts in this vein is his adaptation of the Psalm assigned for today, Psalm 46. “A mighty fortress is our God” is often called the “anthem of the Reformation,” and has been widely translated and adopted well beyond the Lutheran orbit.

The Prelude today is Bach’s treatment of Luther’s melody as the foundation for an organ-piece; the tune is heard in various textures, and against various counter-melodies, as a kind of musical backbone to the piece.

And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, “He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!” The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, “If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!” There was also an inscription over him, “This is the King of the Jews.” One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, “Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!” But the other rebuked him, saying, “Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.” Then he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.” He replied, “Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.”
