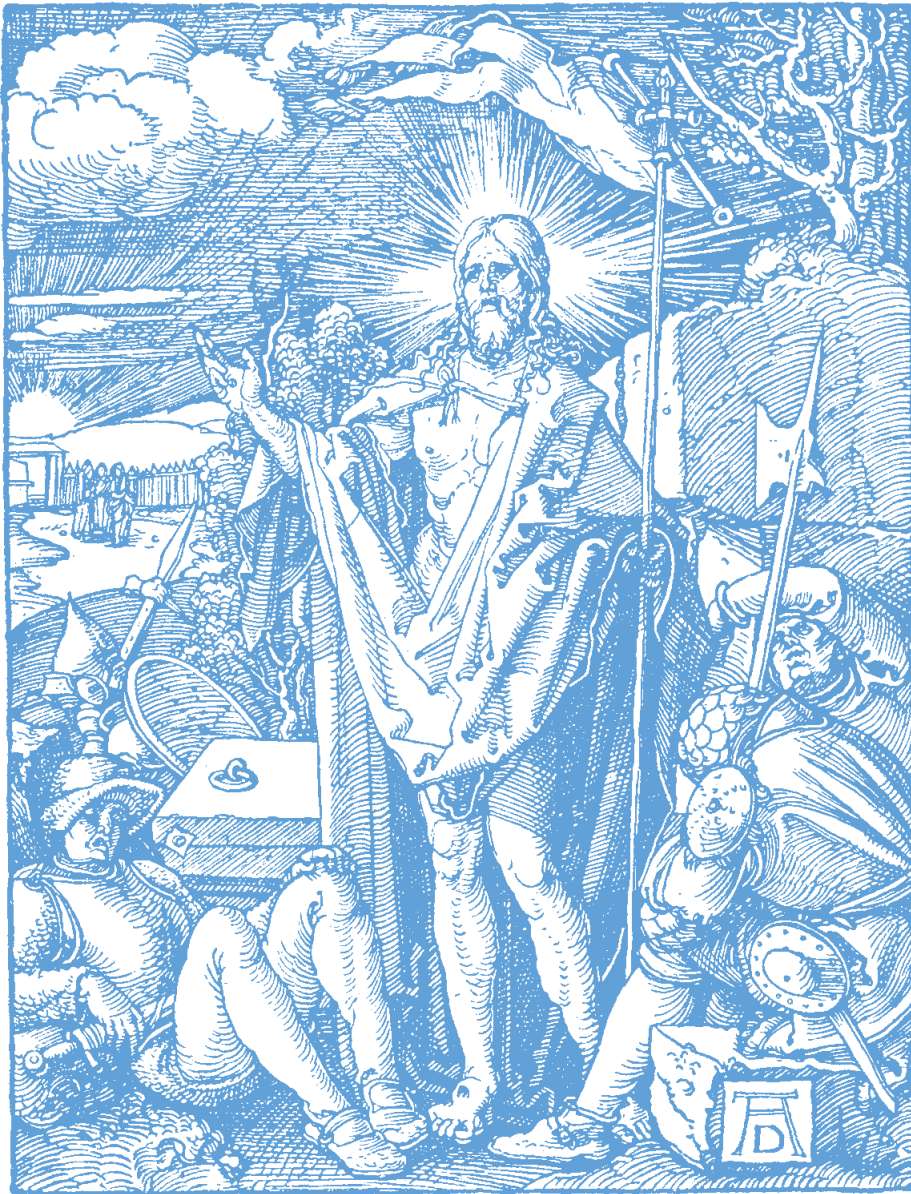

## *Musical Notes*

We extend a warm welcome and our thanks to the instrumentalists who enrich our services this morning: Charles Lirette, Chad Winkler, and Rick Murrell, *trumpet*, Jason Allison, *horn*, Jim Nova, *trombone*, and Stanley Nevola, *percussion*.

G.F. Handel's *Messiah* needs little introduction, but the chorus from it heard this morning after the Lesson from Acts stands out, since it begins with the only moment of *a cappella* singing in the whole oratorio. This dramatically spare beginning, for "Since by man came death," gives way to accompanied jubilation for the ensuing phrase, "by man came also the resurrection." The succeeding pair of phrases, "For as in Adam all die" and "Even so in Christ shall all be made alive," repeat this effective contrast.

George Herbert was an early seventeenth-century poet and cleric, little known in his own day, or, indeed, until the rediscovery of his poetry in the late nineteenth century. His esteem has gained steadily since then; his fusion of deep pastoral devotion and literary merit has proved to be a compelling combination. Roland Martin (b. 1955) is a teacher, organist, and composer based in Western New York; he has composed a considerable and growing body of very fine sacred music.

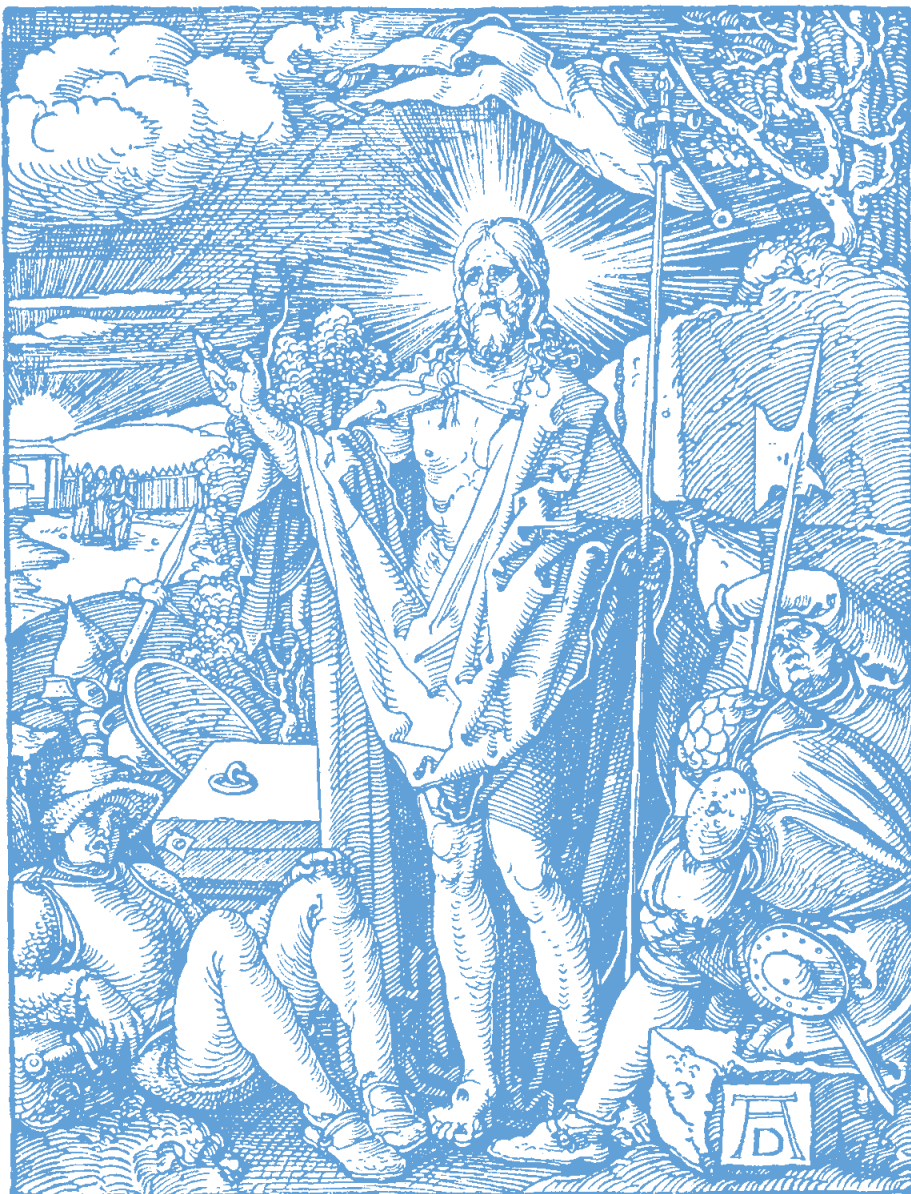
The English composer Grayston Ives (b. 1948) spent many years as the Organist of Magdalen College, Oxford, and has composed widely, particularly for the Church. Though originally composed in 2005 for a wedding, *O Voice of the Beloved*, setting a text based on verses from the Song of Solomon, is beautifully consonant with the vernal themes of Easter.

Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) was for more than six decades the organist of the great Parisian basilica of St-Sulpice, home of what is still one of the great monuments of French organ-building, a magnificent instrument built by Aristide Cavaille-Coll. Widor helped to pioneer the genre of the organ symphony, pieces in which the formal and sonorous expectations of the orchestral symphony were translated to the organist's fingers and feet. The Toccata that concludes the fifth of his organ symphonies has become a widely-loved favorite; continuous arpeggiation in the hands makes a glittering foil to a thunderous and slow-moving theme in the pedals (heard today with brass, in an arrangement made by the American church-musician Richard Proulx).

## *Musical Notes*

We extend a warm welcome and our thanks to the instrumentalists who enrich our services this morning: Charles Lirette, Chad Winkler, and Rick Murrell, *trumpet*, Jason Allison, *horn*, Jim Nova, *trombone*, and Stanley Nevola, *percussion*.

The Dublin-born composer Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924) was an important composer and musical educator in late-Victorian and Edwardian England. His strophic part-song, *When Mary thro' the Garden Went*, sets Mary Coleridge's evocative meditation on the first encounter between Mary and the resurrected Jesus.

G.F. Handel's *Messiah* needs little introduction, but the chorus from it heard this morning after the Lesson from Acts stands out, since it begins with the only moment of *a cappella* singing in the whole oratorio. This dramatically spare beginning, for "Since by man came death," gives way to accompanied jubilation for the ensuing phrase, "by man came also the resurrection." The succeeding pair of phrases, "For as in Adam all die" and "Even so in Christ shall all be made alive," repeat this effective contrast.

George Herbert was an early seventeenth-century poet and cleric, little known in his own day, or, indeed, until the rediscovery of his poetry in the late nineteenth century. His esteem has gained steadily since then; his fusion of deep pastoral devotion and literary merit has proved to be a compelling combination. Roland Martin (b. 1955) is a teacher, organist, and composer based in Western New York; he has composed a considerable and growing body of very fine sacred music.

The English composer Grayston Ives (b. 1948) spent many years as the Organist of Magdalen College, Oxford, and has composed widely, particularly for the Church. Though originally composed in 2005 for a wedding, *O Voice of the Beloved*, setting a text based on verses from the Song of Solomon, is beautifully consonant with the vernal themes of Easter.

The English-born organist and composer Healey Willan (1880-1968) passed most of his professional life in Toronto, Ontario, becoming the Dominion's most famous composer (and the first to be honored on a postage stamp!). In addition to teaching at the Toronto Conservatory, he worked as a church-musician, most notably at the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, a small but vital Anglo-Catholic community which he served for more than forty-five years. *Rise up, my love* is typical of his almost-countless small-scale sacred compositions for choir: beautifully expressive of its text, and executed with consummate craft.

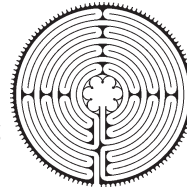
## Movie Night: Thursday, April 20

## A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles [10:34-43]

Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is LORD of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him.
